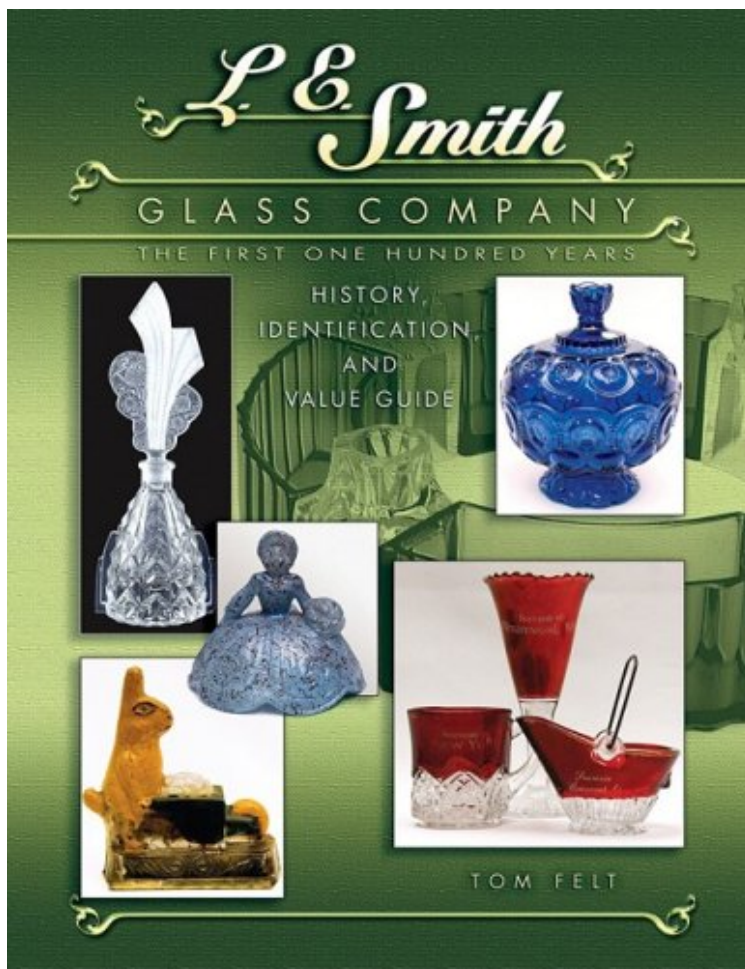

The early photos and background of the company are very informative and make for interesting reading. The photos of the glassware are very clearly identified and offer a wide range of the product produced by L E Smith over the years. I enjoyed this book and highly recommend it as a reference to all glass lovers.

This book is unparalleled in its findings the author has had access to factory records previously undocumented in other publications. Black glass, cobalt glass from the 1920s and 1930s, milk glass from the 1950s, and over 20 patterns from the early years are featured. Mount Pleasant and Moon Star are also given full coverage using a combination of original photos, vintage photos from company files, and catalog reprints. But besides the well-known items produced by the company, some collectible areas where Smith's contribution has remained virtually unknown are also highlighted: ruby-stained souvenir ware, rare candy containers made during the teens and twenties, Art Deco figural powder jars, and figural boudoir lamps. Fully illustrated are Smith's popular animal figurines, covered animal dishes, and many other specialized products. Over 1,000 photographs and catalog reprints make this volume the ideal introduction to one of the only American handmade glass companies that is still in operation after 100 years. 2007 values.

As per the title, this 400 page book covers the first 100 years (1907-2007) of the L E Smith Glass Company, and provides a detailed insight into the triumphs and pitfalls of the glass manufacturing industry. The book is broken down into eleven categories, some of which are "History", "Colors", "The Patterns" and "Specialized Products". It contains 1008 Plates (illustrations) for various pieces. About the Author Tom Felt's introduction to glassware began in 1977 when he and his partner, Bob O'Grady, admired a pair of candlesticks at a friend's house. Little did they know that would lead to one of the most complete collections of Heisey candlesticks anywhere, and would also result in their first book, Heisey Glass Candlesticks, Candelabra, and Lamps. Tom has since written two other books on Heisey and became a regular contributor to the Glass Collector's Digest and other periodicals.
