

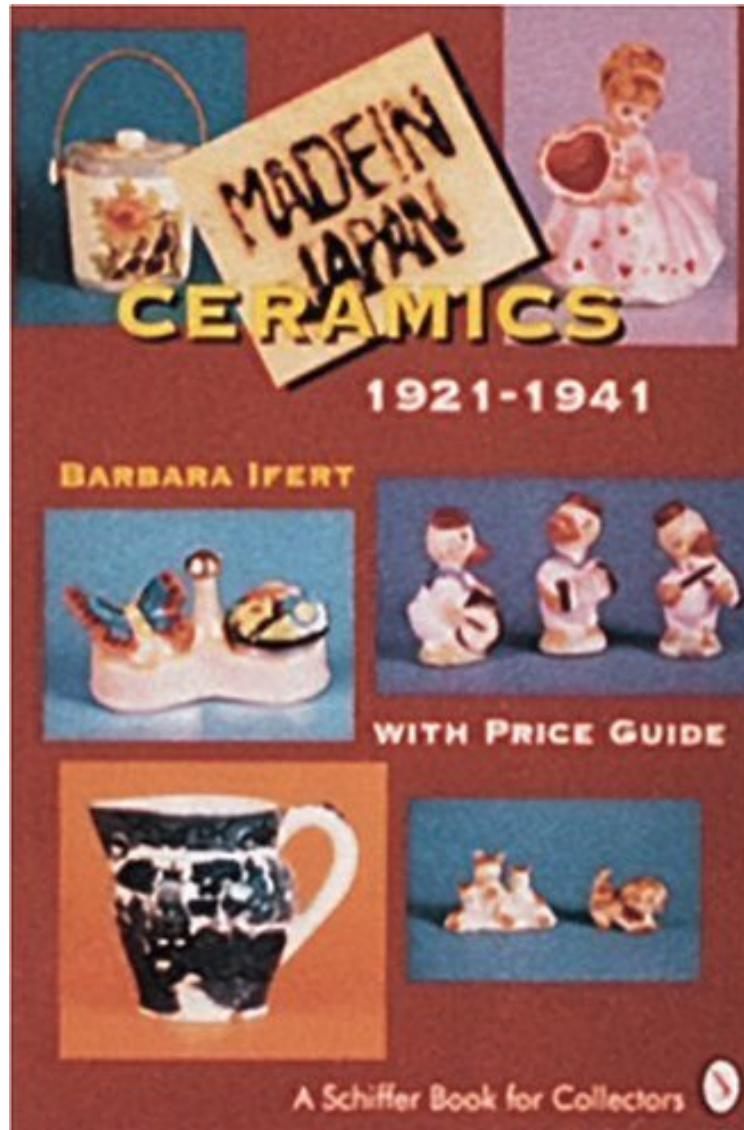

most items. This book shows pictures identifying the several different markings applied at the factories in Japan for export to the United States. These marks may be stamped, embossed, or incised or may be a paper label. The marks was only a small portion of the history found in this book. I have a toy tea set in the original box that was given to my Mother in 1935, when she was 8, from her brother who had just come home on leave (he was stationed in Japan). My mother did not play with this set very much and kept it in the box; therefore, the box and the toy set are still in very good shape and this is what got me started with collecting items from this time period. I have many items but did not realize much about them until I read this book. This new book is an excellent reference for the multitude of ceramics items marked "MADE IN JAPAN" that were exported between 1921 and 1941, after Japanese manufacturers used the "NIPPON" mark and before the "MADE IN OCCUPIED JAPAN" mark. The 350 color photographs show hundreds of household ceramics arranged in an easy-to-find alphabetical order from ash trays to wall pockets. The Price Guide makes clear that this is an excellent field for collectors priced out of other fields. Here are many humorous and novelty designs in planters, cookie jars, pitchers, teapots, cups, creamers, sugar bowls, vases, pincushion holders, lamps, dishes and salt and pepper shakers. When considering items marked "MADE IN JAPAN," expect the unexpected!
