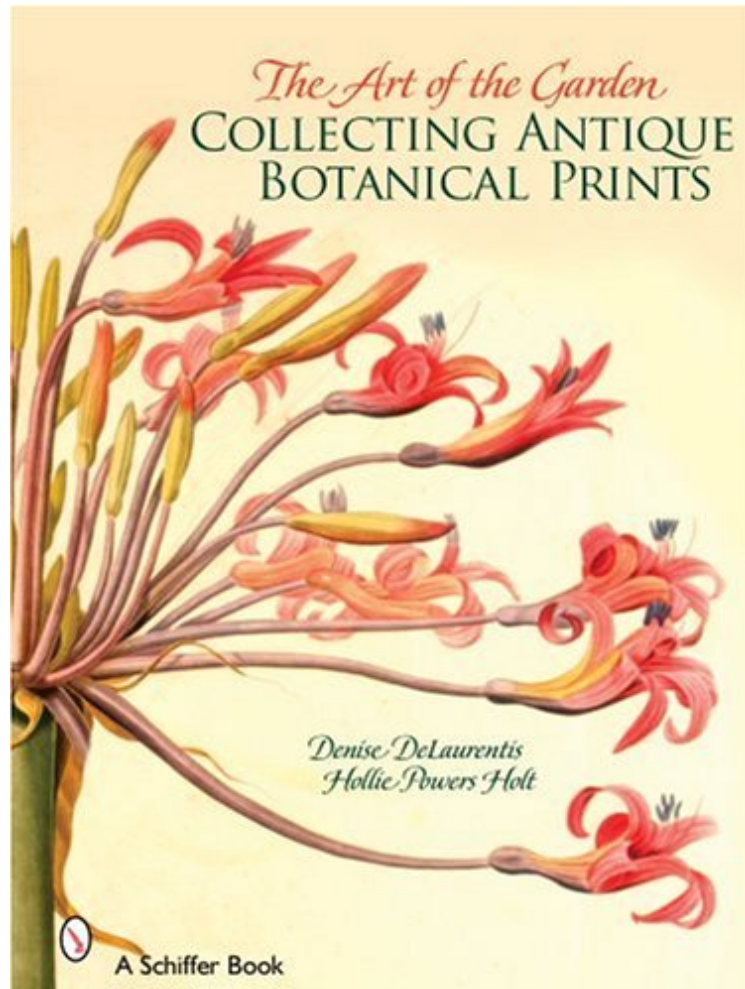

So much so that want to acquire some *prudently*. So we needed to read up on the subtleties of this enchanting art form. Mind you, buying prints isn't like buying a one-of-a-kind painting. Every single one is copy. There is no "original", yet prices range from less than \$600 to a \$6000 for what may be described as identical items (or, dangerously, auction lots). So we had hoped that The Art of the Garden, written by people who appear to be professionals in the field, would supply some useful technical and professional insight regarding how to judge and evaluate prints, how they are made -- the papers, the engraving

process, the inks, who, when and how they are colored, what happens to the plates over time, what determines the market value of a print, etc., etc., etc. Much to learn. However, this book is largely just another coffee table tome of albeit lovely pictures. It provides a good starting point in terms of listing and illustrating major artists, with a smattering of historical context. But it is disappointingly stingy on text and couldn't be less scholarly. The authors are clearly vendors, not academics, much less scholars. Even the bibliography is a disappointment. Bamber Gascoigne does a better job on the technicalities of the media and Shirley Sherwood has published on past and present artists of note. Some of the classic references are the Hunt Institute's catalog (available from used booksellers), Claus Nissen's (in German), Sotheby's "Magnificent Collection of Botanical Books" (for books more than prints -- although most prints in commerce have been liberated from dismembered books), Sitwell, Blunt Synge's "Great Flower Books" and Blunt's classic, "Art of Botanical Illustration", among others.³ of 3 people found the following review helpful.
