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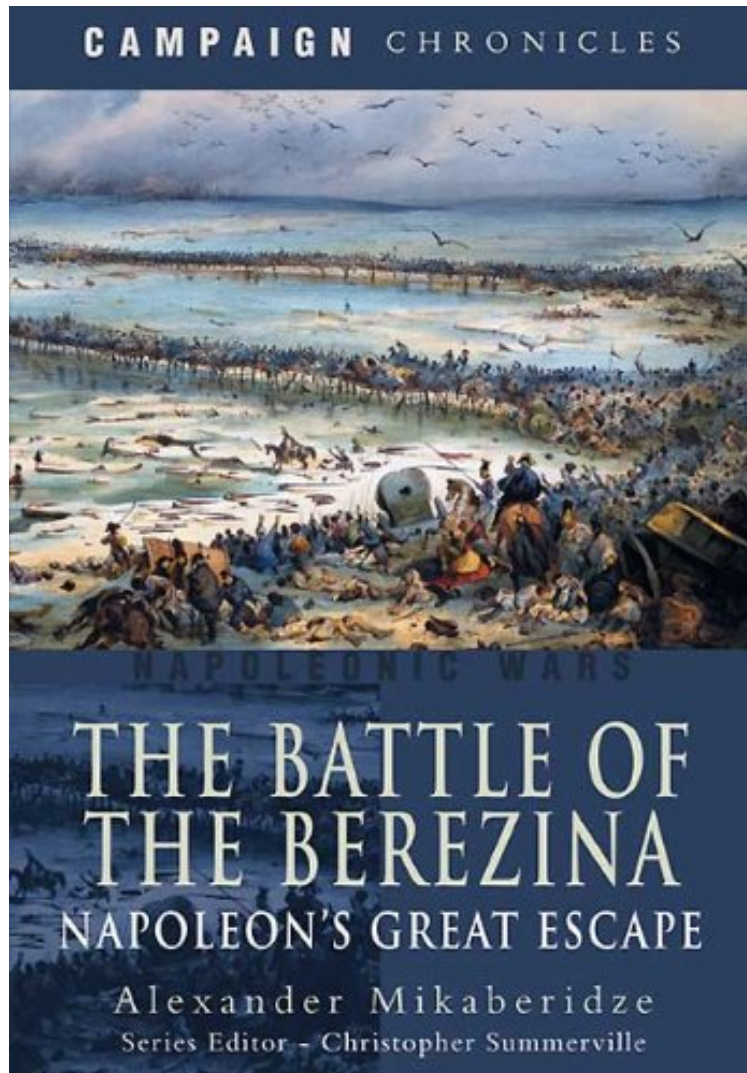

To date I have found all his works well researched, well written, and endlessly interesting. Mikaberidze makes us of original Russia, French, German, Dutch, and even English sources to weave a powerful and compelling story. His "The Battle of the Berezina" is filled with interesting details and drama. The Battle of the Berezina heralded the end of Napoleon's vaunted army of more than 600,000 men that had invaded Russia in June 1812.This book is recommended for those interested in Napoleon, the Napoleonic Wars, the French 1812 Campaign in

A DETAILED STUDY IN ENGLISH By J. Evans There are many works covering the 1812 campaign and all address the crossing at the Berezina River but none go into the detail provided by this work. Mr. Mikaberidze has provided us with great in-depth study that is, fortunately, not written in a too academic style. The author has struck a great balance in his coverage between the Allied (French) and Russian forces which greatly aided in understanding the decision making process on both sides. He has also provided a nice mixture of strategic/tactical movements and personal accounts. Cons: Not many really. An order of battle could have been included, but that is easy to find in many other works (and notoriously difficult to confirm). My only complaint would be in regards to maps, something this work shares with just about every other campaign history I've ever read. It is extremely frustrating to try and follow unit movements and not be able to find the mentioned locations on the map. This is a common problem from which the reviewed work is not exempt. Overall: Highly recommended, academic in its coverage yet readable. I know of no other work in English that covers the topic even remotely as well.

In the winter of 1812, Napoleon's army retreated from Moscow under appalling conditions, hunted by three separate Russian armies, its chances of survival apparently nil. By late November Napoleon had reached the banks of the River Berezina - the last natural obstacle between his army and the safety of the Polish frontier. But instead of finding the river frozen solid enough to march his men across, an unseasonable thaw had turned the Berezina into an icy torrent. Having already ordered the burning of his bridging equipment, Napoleon's predicament was serious enough: but with the army of Admiral Chichagov holding the opposite bank, and those of Kutusov and Wittgenstein closing fast, it was critical.
