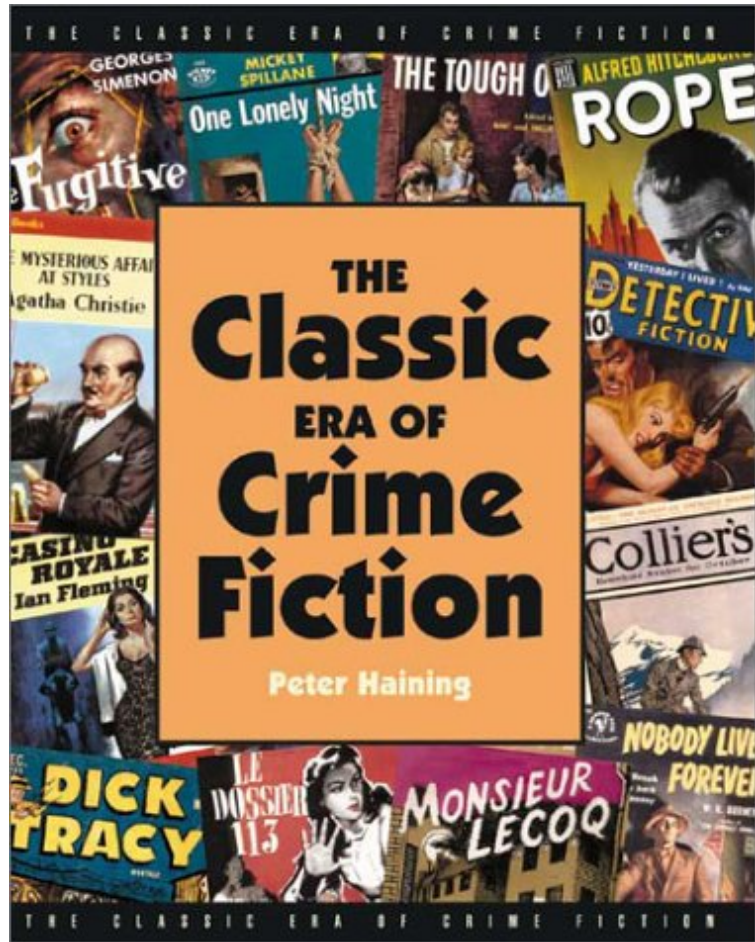

It would have been very easy to add new material for the last 10 years of developments in scholarship/understanding about the golden age of detective fiction.

From Sherlock Holmes and James Bond to Edgar Allan Poe and Joseph Conrad, this book explores an exciting cultural history.
