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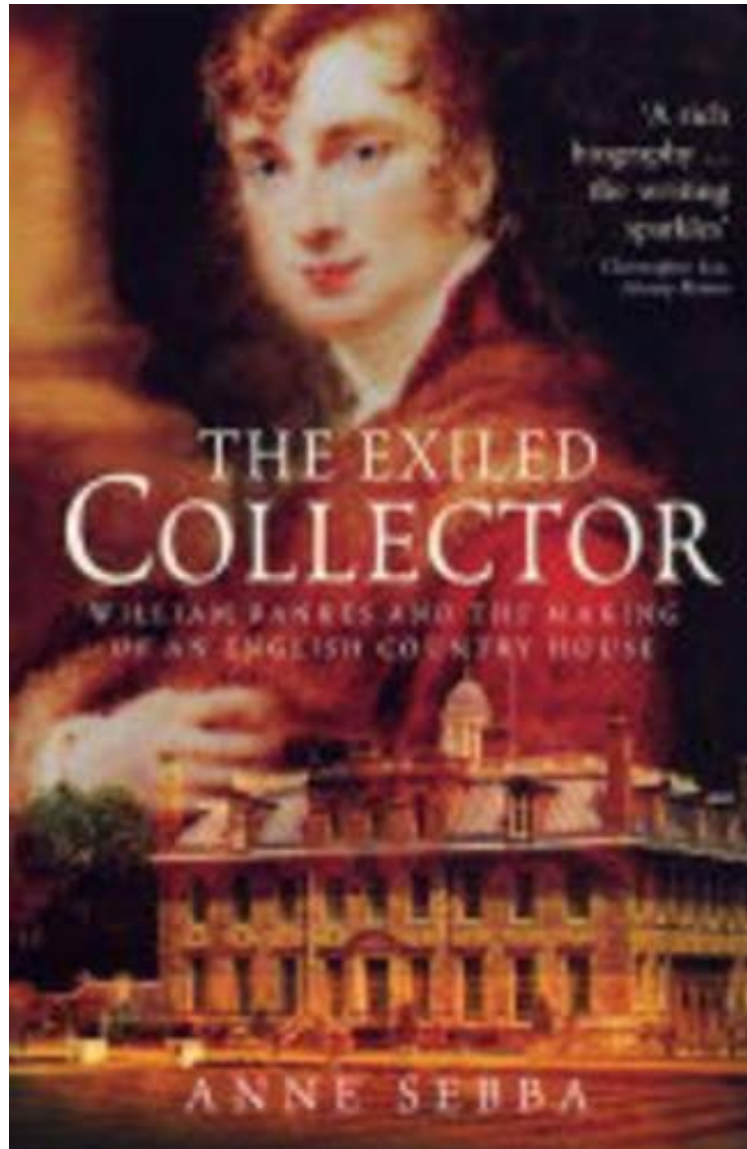

It is about the unfortunate William Bankes, who died in exile in Venice in 1855 after twice having been arrested in London on homosexual charges at a time when the death penalty applied. He was a member of Parliament, a pioneering Egyptologist and the owner of Kingston Lacy, a mansion which became his obsession, resulting in him becoming a fanatical art collector in hopes of creating a perfect

home. It is now open to the public. At least half of the text is devoted to the mansion. On August 30th 1841 William John Bankes, former Tory MP, pioneer Egyptologist and renowned traveller, was caught in compromising circumstances with a guardsman in London's Green Park. Faced with the death penalty, he fled to exile in Venice, leaving forever his beloved house, Kingston Lacy in Dorset. It was the vicarious embellishment of this house that was to be his only enduring passion.
